## 92-02 16 South Africa defeats Pakistan

CANBERRA (Reuter-Kyodo) South Africa took six late wickets to grab victory in their first-ever cricket match against Pakistan on Saturday, clinching the historic one-day friendly by 17 runs

in front of a crowd of only 2,000. Pakistan lost the six wickets for 16 runs in the hectic last four overs, having earlier appeared to be coasting to a win in the warm-up for the World Cup later this month. Pakistan, at one stage 172 for four, were all out for 188 chasing South Africa's 205 for five at tiny Manuka Oval. "They weren't at full strength but a win is a win and it'll give us a lot of confidence," said South African coach Mike Procter after his side's second international one-day win since ending 28 years of isolation. The first was against India.

## 49ers owner probed for sex assault



MENLO PARK, Calif. (AP) San Francisco 49ers owner Edward DeBartolo Jr. has been accused by a female acquaintance of assaulting her at his suburban home, police said on Thursday. Menlo

Park police are investigating the allegation, but no charges have been filed, said Det. Dominick Peloso during a news conference. Authorities didn't make the allegations public until Thursday, mindful of publicity drawn to the rape trials of boxer Mike Tyson and William Kennedy Smith, Peloso said. The woman, whose name was withheld, told police DeBartolo assaulted her about 12:30 a.m. Tuesday at his Menlo Park residence, about 25 miles (40 km) south of San Francisco. The woman told investigators she and DeBartolo were among a group of people eating and drinking together at a restaurant. A group of them left the restaurant and continued the party at DeBartolo's home, where the alleged assault occurred.
