AIM;

CONTEXT:

THEMES:

To present a unique visual art event in Johannesburg which will re-introduce and celebrate the fresh introduction of South African art, artists and the South African public to contemporary international trends. This will be achieved by inviting acclaimed and emergent artists to exhibit alongside Southern Africans in such a way that true international artistic exchange can occur.

Our interition is that the internationalism of ORBIS AFRICANUS 95 will effectively celebrate with the global art fraternity, South Africa's re-integration into the international exnikition arena. i is our intention that this exciting event will bring critics, writers, dealers, artists and arts administrators into contact with the South African art scene, and Johannesburg in particular.
