SOUTH AFRICA ,S FIRS T DEMOCRA TIC ELECTION!

WHO CAN VOTE?

For the first time in South Africal's history a truly democratic election will be held. South Africans of all races who are over the age of 18 may vote. You will have two votes - one for the National Assembly and one for the

Regional Assembly.

ELECTIONS IN THE
OLD SOUTH AFRICA

Under Apartheid, only racial minorities had the vote and only whites had real power. Even for those who could vote, there was a "winner-take-all" system that silenced the voice of those who did not vote for the winning party. Even if the winning party won by only a few votes they held all of the power and controlled the whole country. All this has been changed and we now have a completely new system.

THE NEW SYSTEM:
PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

In the new system every vote will count! The more votes a party wins, the stronger they will be in the new Assemblies. The party that wins the most votes will have most say. But the parties that win less votes will still have a say in the running of the country. For example, a party that wins 20% of the National Ballot will have 20% of the seats in the National Assembly. In this way it is more difficult for any single group to control all the power in the country. There will be no "winner-take-all", as in past elections.

HOW DOES THE NEW TWO-BALLOT ELECTION WORK?

You have two votes. One vote is for the National Assembly, that is the central government . Your other vote is for the Regional Assembly that governs your region. You could vote for two different parties with your two votes. Or you could vote for the same party to represent you in the National

Assembly and in your Regional Assembly.

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY?

The National Assembly will be the new central government (parliament). The National Assembly, together with a senate that will be appointed from the nine regions, will also rewrite South Africa's constitution. To Change the new constitution, more than two thirds of the representatives must agree.

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WHAT ARE THE REGIONAL ASSEMBLIES?

The Regional Assemblies will make it possible

A Regional Assembly will govern those matters
most Closely affecting people in each region. A
party which gets, for example, a quarter of the
votes cast in the Regional Ballot gets a quarter
of the representatives in the regions Regional
Assembly.
