He had knocked off early because of warnings of pending trouble in the township. For 'lteasons of snicty" the workers had gatheted at the fedory gate to walk into the township together. Youths had war. ned them that "the Zulu's from KweMadeln were attacking". 11tey entered the township as one group but when shots wete tired at them by a group of about 200 men, they had run back to the factory.

They had seen an SADF vehicle pauing them and had stopped it. "We asked them to accompnny us into the township. They said their vehicle was not bullet proof but they promised to try and stop the shootin8.!v -However. the vehicle then headed towards KwaMadala Hostel, not the township. lt returned accompanied by an SADF ermoured vehicle. The driver of the armoured vehicle told the workers nothing was going on in the township, but while the driver was speaking they could hear the sound of gunshots and breaking glass. Mr Mahaselle aid. "He also said that the SADF could not urest enyone, but only take them out of the township." The SADF driver then escorted White workers. who had travelled in their can, out of the area. Afterwards ambulances arriving on the scene. agreed to take the workers into the township to help clear barricades. They had helped the 'es in a hque-tohouse tench for the injuted. Ml' Mahasella said police had tried to prevent them entering a home in which two dead' children and an injured mother lay. uThey said to us that we must go home and that they would take care of the situation. but we were not satisfied with that."_ Mr Anton Mostert. counsel for the SADF, said Mr Mahasella's account moreot-less supported the SADF's account of the evening in question with a few minor differences. He reiterated the SADF had not been in any way involved in the massacre and that the only unit present in the township had been the Val Commando. an active citizen unit charged

with guarding lwor. Mr Christw phet Mbtlta (30). Mr Derek Maiosi (21). and Mr Petrus Buthetezi (3!). on (Mgi/ // \$19; 13 counts of murder, 17 counts of attempted murder and the possessiun of illegal (items and ammunition. The men. all Zuiuspeuking residents of Alexandra. were found not guilty on all the charges. and accordingly discharged. Mr Mniosi. Mr Bathelezi and the Mbata brothers originally appeared in connection with a brutal attack on a group of moumets holding a vigil for Mrs Jane Ramokgola of Alexandra. on March 27.1991. Mrs Ramokgola, who was of Swazi origin, was t fatally wounded by three unidentified gunmen on March 11. and died at the Knlnfong Hospital on Msrch 20. Dating the vigil, a group of men carrying various firearms. including an AK-47 rifle. opened tire on the mourners. killing 13 people and wounding 17 others. "Defeneeless people were literally moved down." Mr Justice Daniels seid. Mr Justice Daniels said, however. that the testimonies of the 13 eyewitnesses who positively identitied the four newsed as the killers. had been "inconsistent and unreliable". The judge said the mourners had fled into a dark bedroom. where the attackers had then opened tire. The only light in

the house was the kitchen light, 1 single, yellow 1 bulb. Mr Justice Daniels said it was "a physical impossihi'ity" for the witnesses to hate seen the fame of their attackers. II the light treat the kitchen would have been shining on the hack: of the gunmen. The sttnckers IIIO could not have been visible far more than I minute. while gunmoke in the room would have fur-

Mr JuStice Goldstonets mling follows an objection lodged by counsel for the SADF. Mr Anton Mostert. who said the report in the latest edition of the Sunday Times "contained blatant falsehoods". Mr Mostert told the Gotdstone Committee. hearing evidence on the June 17 Boipatong massacre. that the reported claim that the SADF had displayed hostility m probing by the Commission. was incorrect. "There was no such E hostility. We made the fullest possible disciosure." He asked Mr Justice Goldstone to call Sunday Times editor Ken Owen to appear before the Commission and explain. After consideration of the report. Mr Justice Goldstone ruled this would be unnecessary. "However the Committee does request the :45tor of Sunday Ttmes to publish the correct facts as set out with appropriate prominence in the next edition of the Sunday Times." Mr Justice Goldstone described as misleading the headlincton the front page of the newspaper which real! "Judge urges) SADF lnqut'ry".
