Teimg of Refeience:

For its terms 04 reierence the Commission was guided by the documents of the National Fundraising Wort shop held in March 1986 at SOMAFCD and the h:eynete address delivered by the Treasurer General at the opening 0% this workshop.

Using the abovee mentioned documents as a point of departure, the Commission agreed that the idgEiii\$\$a\$ifEtszE2EQE ANC needs arisegb 159m its historical test s to prosecute the struggle to liberate QMrnhanUP__CDdH%Fy frum apartheid tyranny, m:ilita::i?,politicalt21 economically, culturally and diplomatice

In this regard the Commission fully endorsed the needs as outlined in the 1986 document, wigs Btuxg

- i) the reepuneibility fer the maintenance and wellmbeing 0% t.housande 0% people based in many countries inbeQEQ-aaeeea__ei food, transport, clqthing, education etc
- 11) the respunsibility \$or the provision 0% the heceeeary \$inancee for these going home
- iii) the maintenance 0% underground operatives and organisations \$unctioning legally' :qsiAL SoLHeafeti iv) the ee tabli ehment and upkeep of ANC missions abroad

In agreeinartheee abovewmentioned needs the Commission noted the following:

- i) that the Situation inside South Airica had deteriorated drastically a5 a result 0% the state of emergency
- ii) that the developments in the region, in particular the events.haae 1n Seuth Western Africa had necessitated that our movement engage in a massive exercise to relocate our military percehnel, eapping very heavily our meagre Feseurcee M"? 11.9k
- iii) that at the international level the /ANC has been subjected to a severe /6nelaught nrchestrated by the Pretoria regime and deeigned to tarnish our image and thus diminish our sources of funding

The Commission cnncluded that these factors have impased a greater responsibility on our movement, not only in terms of the volume of assistance required but also in the range of types of aid, all 0% which is representative of a situation much more urgent than existed in 1986.

In an effwrt to address this state of affairs, the Commission recommend that the following measures be undertaken:

1. Given the tact that our capacity to effectively raise funds from our traditional supporters, such 1g gDyennmeater-t_TWr_1EFan:narr-supeert-_gruupsT__funding agenciesmasawgfr-asetfhf&d%weHHHaaeewesoarces 0% \$unding depends on the e:-(tent t0 which we are able to counter the prevailing antie eANC propaganda and to project a positive AND profile, we need to embark upon an aggressive propagandalcampaign.

This campaign should invelve all AND structures and especially our missidns abroad with a view tofWYnnimf_ new triends far the movement.

. The AND needs to have a databank of all the ex isting aid agencies and other potential resources in order to have a thorough understanding 0% their operations. Such information will ensure that we are enabled to assess the priorities upon which they should be approached as well as identity new resources.

As a first step the Chiei Hepres entatives (and Regional Treasurers where applicable) should obtain such infermation and make appropriate recommendations to the UTE). "HAJWJLLL-1

The Commission recommended that (/the Chief Representatives in the Nordic Regior where the deudpggziieal support exists should collect such P information and jointly make appropriate recommendations to H9 within the next three months.

3. In addition to the traditional supporters of our movement, the Commission strongly urged that new areas be explored as recommended by the 1986 tundraising workshop. These areas include:

a) Africa

Whilst recognising that Africa is afflicted with numerous problems such as the debt crisis, the Cemmission agreed that contributions in kind can be mobilised. In this connection the Chief Reps in Africa should make pledges to collect frem their respective areas items such as artetacts to contribute to AME projects in Eurepe and elsewhere.

b) 351 a 9:99)

The Commission noted that #gome of our e communities originate Tram gountries like 1fe4pngvg1 Malayeia, SF1 Lanka and Ineiaz'and that these . links sheuld be utilised to conduct fundraising efforts in these countries. Materials and provisions on which money is now being spent, such a5 textiles, sugar, tea etc ceuld be obtained from these countries. This would release funds for other purposes. In working out this scheme account will have to be taken of the cost 0% transporting such goods se that it is not toe great compared to the value at the goods obtained.

:) Middle East I:

The AND Should be able to Tollow up the two visite by the AND Presidential delegations to this area in an eitort to raise funds.

d) EgtigmAmerica

In order to conduct effective Tundraising campaigns in this region the question of the opening of ANC missions in this region should be addreeeed with the urgency it deservee. This will enable our movement to take advantage of the goodwill created, for instance, by the Amandla tour d\$ Brazil.

a. th Resources

The AND ehould utilise the ex erience o' other liberation movements in the areagi setting its own enterprises

- a) The establishment of a travel agency. This will not only save us the huge expenses incurred through purchasing of air fares and services, but will also generate additional income.
- 0) Since the AND offices abroad cannot serve as marketing mutlete for the items to be collected from Africa and elsewhere, we urge the establishment of procurement and marketing centres as recommended by the 1986 Fundraising erkehop.
- c) The Commiseian urges the rigorous implementation of the decision to extract contributions and pledges from our members who are gainfully employed.
- d) In order to save our missions the expense of additional staff, the Commission recommends that maximum utility of volunteer work in the respective countries he made. Of course this ehould not in any way jeopardise security.

The Cummieeien Turther recommends the streamlining and usage QT AND personnel in our projects.

- 4. Eghdin for Internal Struggle
- a) The Commission recommends that the movement, particularly our mieeione abroad, sheuld urgently embark on campaigns to expose the "Diecloeure 0% Foreign Funding" Bill which will severely curtail the ability of the MDM to raise funds.
- b) The Commieeion recommends the popularisation Of the ANC Free South Africa Fund.
- c) The Commission Turther recommends proper coordination between the liberation movement and the MDM td' streamline and identify sources of funding abroad.
- d) The Commission appreciates the establishment of co-Dps and other self reliance schemes conducted in South Africa and urges the movement to encourage them.
- e) The Cemmiesien recommends that the MDM be encouraged to explore means towards greater Belfereliance through the direct contribution of the people.

In making the above recommendations the commission wishes to submit that it has by no means exhausted all the possibilities in tapping the sources 0% funding and exploring new possibilities. It is however the cuneidered view of the commission that the implementation 04 the above recommendations will go a long way in addressing the eerieus problems presently \$aced by our movement in the discharge of its historic obligations namely the DESTRUCTION OF APARTHEID AND THE FORMATION OF A NDNeRACIAL DEMOCRATIC SOUTH AFRICA.
