In the eastern part of the island, 234Q Indian Soldiers posing as Moslems, lumberjacks killed two Tamil rebels Wednesday in Batticaloa, military officials said.

The Indian soldiers, wearing saris, were riding in a truck carrying freshly cut timber when they were stopped by four Tiger rebels at a checkpoint at Kanchan-ikan village, 35 miles south of Batticaloa.
