A TEAM of civil rights lawyers from overseas on Saturday blamed Inkatha Freedom Party leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi for the escalation of violence in Hack township; The lawyers recommended that KweZttlu Police be placed under South African Police commend.

But in its preliminary report on its two-week mission here. the International Commission of Jurists: team said the African National Congress had stepped up violent attacks since September last year.

"It is clear that it would not be possible to hold free and fair elections on a one-person, one-vote basis today in the parts of South Africa we have visited." they told a news conference in Johannesburg on Sunday.

"We believe that

South Africans should consider inviting an international election monitoring team to supervise the run-up to elections. as well as the election process itself." they said.

In the past four months more than 300 people have been killed in political violence and Government negotiators have called on black politicians to establish peace if constitutional talks are to advance.

The five-man ICJ team said the KwaZulu Police was biased against foes of the Inkatha Freedom Party and flagrantly joined in attacks on township residents in strife-torn Natal.

"There is overwhelming evidence that they are one-sided. and out of

join in attacks by members of Inkatha on people in their homes." the jurists said in the preliminary report.

Frontline appeals for end to violence

"In 'Culer. the remetn'tng ohetec ee to the creation 0! en atmosphere conducive to con-stitutional negotiations ought to he removed." the communique nut.

The meettn? reiterated tte etrou: eppeel or unity among black South Atrium. expectetly between the Airmen National Congress end the Pen Atrtcentst Conyeee. tn the tece ot consti-tutionel telhl.

M epectel eppeel we: made to the Itheret'ton movements to recognise their common objec-

tive end to unite in the face at the common enemy."

The summit, which was overshadowed by President Robert Mugabe, noted with grave concern the escalation of violence in South Africa resulting in the loss of innocent lives and the destruction of property.

Reaffirming its continued support to the South African liberation struggle and majority rule, but merely I vote to ward off uncertainty on South Africa.

Mr Mugabe said the euphoria of the referendum results were not only deceptive, but also devoid of any objective analysis.

A democratic forum to discuss the new constitution was yet to be set up and agreed upon, he said.

ANC deputy president Walter Sisulu called on the Southern African Development Coordination Centre to meet "as soon as possible" to co-ordinate regional efforts.

A delegation of SADC officials should then visit South Africa to "secure its cooperation in this endeavour," they said in the joint statement.

Further movements until victory were expected, the summit expressed its determination to continue monitoring the evolving situation in South Africa closely and effectively.

It invited the liberation movements to inform the next OAU ad hoc committee meeting in Tananarive on April 28 on their preference with regard to the composition, mandate and location of the monitoring mechanism for the purpose.

Mugabe said the international community should remain committed to Pretoria until the reform process was "irreversibly irreversible".

He told a news conference that the big white "yes" vote was not enough.

"I think those who have lifted sanctions on the result at the referendum are being deceitful," said Mr Mugabe. - Sapa-Renter.

Liberation movements express doubts. Sisulu said the South African Government's interim arrangements, which it presented to working group 3 of Codesa on March 23, had raised serious problems about the Government's conduct in negotiations. "The pre-election transitional arrangements have the effect
