The Codes: Management Committee meets on Monday with I firm undertaking by the government end the ANC to try and selvuge the deadlocked situation in Working Group II.

The agreement was teuhed during bilatersl talks held at Jan Smut: Airport on Saturday. but we: net enough to ward off the ANC alliances mass action planned for Tuesday.

The threatened action. the start of a sustained "pretest war" to unseat the government, is expected to make progress difficult but there is a glimmer of hope that a protracted confrontation may now be averted.

A senior geyemment souxcc said On Monday morning. there was lJctt agreement between the government end the ANC that they would look afresh at the deadlock in Working Group 2. which involves constitutional pf'u'tctples and which derailed the Codes: 11 plenary last month. Direct talks on the stslled issues would be resumed. hopefully immedietely,

The airport talk: on Saturday made no progress in pususding the ANC ta desist in their plans for mus setion. the source uid. However there was agreement that W62 or a teehnicsl committee would re-open negatistions with a view to temoving the difficulties on which the talks had deadlocked.

These include the percentages needed for mending the etmetures. powers duties and functions of regional authorities and a desdloclt-bteekin; meehnnism foe dlssgreements reached in the process of drifting a fine! constitution.

The new effort: will be bleed on documented agreements aheady reached by W62 and attempts will be made to modify these into mutually acceptable form.

. Government Ind National Party sources said that although there was no chance cf the ANC callng off its mass action plans. there was a possibility that these would be modetsted to mobilise token demonstrations rather than full-blown street action. It was also possible that if progress was made in WO2. that the full campaign would be called eff.

However at present it appeared that the ANC Ind its allies were intent on pursuing its action plan through to What it called "exit gate" -- the forced abdication of the government.

This strategy but been mooted at Codesa 11 by the SAC? and articulated by the Trmkei lender. Maj Genetal Bantu Holomlsa. Who challenged the government to "take your bags and gun" The South African Communist Party leader and ANC campaign euurdinstor Mr Ronnie Kurtis gave details of the four-phase plan. culminating in s general strike. to a Sunday newspaper at the P.3/16

weekend. The cumpsign includes occupations. sit-ins. matches. boycotts. acts at disobedienee end disruption of bureaucratic machinery to the point of public sector btesk-down.

It is expected that the government will give its efficiel reaction to the plmned empaign soon.

Business To Support

DURBAN June 12 Sapa

Business should throw its full weight behind the ANC's mus action campaign u this will contribute l'u more to bringing peace and democracy to South Africa. then the recent teferendum had. according to Nelson Mandela.

Addressing business leaders in Durban on Friday night. the African Nstionsl Congtess pxesident stressed that the mess Action campaign was not aimed at the private sector but was a strategy to incense the pace to democracy.

He said that while same hed charged the campaign would impact

negatively on business confidence. the ANC resented the long transition proposed by the government as far more damaging. He explained that investors would not be attracted by the protracted uncertainty.

Mr Mandela seid business should come out in support of the ANC's mass setion cempnign which was aimed at instilling an Interim Government of National Unity that represented all South Mricam.

"If you want us to refrain (from mess Ictian). come out Ind presume the government to agree to an Interim Government.
"No proud country can allow a minority to continue with the mismanagement of theh- government."

The ANC leader ssid the majority of whites held the wrong perception that mass action would lead to violence. The malnstt'eam Press had also propagated this view.

The ANC was committed to peace and peaceful protest While the real causes for Violence were the government. its security forces and Inkltha.

Addressing the issue of nationalisation. Mr Mandela nld this policy remained an instrument of the ANC but if it was ever implemented "it is likely to be used extremely sparingly".

"In fact nationalisation may neve: be used as a strategy if therels maximum co-opetation between business and ourselves."

He explained that some businesses had already become involved it a form of redistribution by allocating huge resources to the country's transition.

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Some businesses were also already making mlsaive efforts to address workers problems by offering housing. training. scholarships end other deniepmentel programmes to them and "we hope the process will ng".

Although the ANC still considered nationalisation IS a strategy it would only implement it if a cost benefit analysis indicated this was the necessary option.

The ANC supported a halmced approach to industrialisation which xaught to overcome regional inequalities end imbalances.

"We're concerned with our economy. We want maximum production and we went to cut down and eliminate unemployment-"Our policies cover the need to open the economy to crane competition and enhance the development of a dynamic private

sector by the application of mti-uust legislation."

Construction Industry Will Lose R19 tn

An estimated R97 million per day could be lost by the construction industry it the MC: mass action campaign goes ahead. lhe Association of SA Quantity Surveyors (Aseqa) wemed on Sunday.

"Retnmhmcnt Ind closures could become the order of the day if mus mien a: this delicate stage of work scarcity was sustained for any length of time." the association said in a statement. "Lost wages could exceed R8 million per day alone which would result in exueme hardship particularly as work is scarce and job uecurity is threatened.

"it is a well known fact that low productivity threatens the SA construction industry and to fuel this by a demand of a mute Stayaway will only enhance the imbalance and threaten its survival further."

Asaqs said the misinformed may imagine there exinecl a aaVittg to the construction industry tesulting (tom unpaid wages. but the opposite was true.

Each element of construction work has n a part of its cost makeup an element of labour cost allowance. and a stoppage does not reduce the quantity of work still to be executed in the completion of any eonsuuetion project."

The newepepet Idvert juxtaposes two photographs Ibove each other -- one graphically depicting t necklace victim. and the ethea I penceful much led by US civil rights leader Dr Martin Luther King.

The caption at. the top of the advert reads; "Mass aetion. Whit is '. to be? This (the necklace) or (the peaceful protest)?"

I'nllee Use Teurgns To Remove People From Church

CRAHAMSTOW-N June 14 Sap:

Thirteen men and 12 women were arrested in Grahamstown after mlice used teu-smoke t0 remove them from a church. SABC radio news reports.

Police liaison officer Col Daneld Prinsloo said the group of people had occupied St Matthews church early on Saturday evening.

Col Prinsloo said that after the group was evacuated from the church. police confiscated a variety of weapons. including a pistol. perigee. kivee Ind knob-kicries.

On Friday the Icting police liaison officer for the Border. Maj H Kuegelertberg. said A women was that in the stomach and a man was shot in the leg.

They were admitted to Frere Hospital. where they are both said to he in a stable Condition.

The incident was not contained in the SAP unrest report. Maj Kocgclmborg said Mr Zamikhaye Mahweshwe. 29. and Miss Koliwa Sofece. 30. were asleep in a shack when two men kicked upert the door and opened fire with AK47s.

A case of attempted murder wee being investigated. said the major. No arrests had been made.

Three people were killed and five others. including two policemen. were injured in overnight unrest violence throughwt the country. Two people were killed and two were injured When groups fought pitched battles with perigee. knives and firelrme in Bobburg-Eut. in the Eat Rand.

A man sustained serious injuries when he was throw'n-off a moving train near Lansingte railwey sltttiurt outside Johannesburg on Friday.

Man Killed After lnknthn Funerai

JOHANNESBURO June 13 Sepa

A man we: killed and eight people. including a policemrt. were wounded in Mzimhlope. Soweto. on Saturday following the funeral of an Inkethe Freedom Party member. police confmned.

A woman was Ilsa Arrested and charged with the illegal passessian of a 9mm pistol and police confiscated a .38 revolver. A shotgun and an mortment of dmgerous weapons, said Soweto police liaison officer Capt Joseph Ngoberti.

Awarding to Capt Ngoben't a sequence of events was sparked at 12.15pm when unknown attackers shat at a group of people armed with traditional weapons. The group was part of In IFP funeral proceuion in Meedowlmds.

One mart was killed and five others wounded in the attack. Police escorting the procession fired tears". birdshct and stoppers after the incident. Capt Ngobeni said.

At 2.10pm police found I mart with a gunshot wound ll Killemey near Mzimhiope and II 2.26pm anather mm was found with gunshot wounds et Mzimhiope station.

Both were taken to Bugwamth Hospital.

At $2.40 \mathrm{pm}$ u policemen. tt Const Majake. was wounded in an incident in Mzimhlope. Capt Ngobeni said. He was taken to the Garden City Clinic.

The Police mobile unit reacted to the sheeting end Arrested a woman found to be in possession of an unlicensed pistol. The uni also confiscated a .38 revolver. a shatgurt end In "assortment of dmgerous weapons".

No other injuries were reported during the incidents which Capt Ngobent said were related.

W/O queu Mdlelerti nid Mr Bongolm Ndunue. Mr Hlumelo quw. Mr Zendisiie Bongwerti and Mr Mzwemndoda Ntisartn. had told him in January 1990 they were dissatisfied with their rank: and salaries.

W/O Mdleieni uid Mr Ndunue had urged him to persuade his troops to join the venture and had promised him a prominent msition in the Trenskei Governmem in return for his usimnce. lit: had urged the men to lodge their complaints With the military ruier. Maj-Gett Bantu Holomise. and reminded them that if their attempt aborted they could face a long term of imprisonment. W/o MdIeieni admitted that most of the infon-ntttion relayed to him was through Mr Ndunase. who has since been grutted indemnity against prosecution as a State witness. Mt qutu. Mr Bongweni. and Mr Ntinn: are facing charges of conspiring to commit treason. alternatively preparing to wnge war. They have pleaded not guilty and are all being held in custody.

Labour Dispute Led to Unionists Assusinetioa

A labour dispute seemingly ted to the nsnssination of a top Trmkeim trade unionist in Umuta on Thursday night.

Mr Juleyi Hlekiso we; the chairman of the Transite't region of the Transport and General Workers Union (TGWU)-

He was shot in the head and neck It point-bllnk range. and police later said that two spent cartridge: from n Mekuov pistol hut been found at the scene of the murder.

The TGWU is currently at loggerhelds with the Trmlkei Reed Transport Corpontiun. The TRTC mutegement has refused to reinstate 360 workers. including the murdered nun. who were dismissed from the eorpontion in 1990.

According to Trmskei CID chief Gen Thoumile Ngceke. two men in combat uniforms resembling that of the Transkei Police. shut the unionist in his ear net: the TGWU offices in Umtm -- npparently It point-blmk range.

The murderers shut their victim twice in the neck and head. He died instantly.

Two Meklrmv pistol cartridge: were picked up by police on the scene of the incident. Gen Ngceke said.

He pointed out that police combat uniform: were readily nvnitnble in Tramkeian cioxhing shops. and stressed that the killers were definitely not membets of the Tnmkei Police.
